Writing about art can be difficult–it's tricky to *describe* art using words, let alone analyze it. Ask yourself a subset of these questions to begin your description and analysis!


Material

- What is the work made of?
- How big is it?
- What kind of tools did the author use?
- For all these questions, why?

Quality



• How much time, effort, and craftsmanship did the creator put into it?





Context

- When was the work created?
- How was it received?



- What was happening in society at the time?
- What were society's values?
- What was happening in the artist's life?
- Do similar works exist or is this one unique?

Purpose

- Who is the target audience?
- How do you feel after seeing it?
- Which part attracts your attention first?
- What was the artist's reason to create this?

• E.G. commission, religion, patriotism, recognition, romance, etc.

Interpretation and Analysis

What does this piece tell us about the artist, history, society, the world as a whole, or perhaps something else? You can connect this idea with your previous observations and analysis from this guide!
